## A Plethora of Opportunities

– A Message from Rabbi Scott Meltzer

Summer is upon us. I have a confession to make: I love summer! Granted I miss the old days of having summers off, but summers are still slower, more daylight hours, more time outside, more of the easy, good life. Summer always feel more carefree.

You and I live in a time and place unprecedented in human history in terms of comfort. We used to pray that “the sun will not harm you by day not the moon by night” (Psalms 121:6). Clearly the author of this Psalm did not have central air and heating. We, here in the United States, have managed to rescue ourselves from so many of the afflictions of human history – we are protected from the elements, even from drought.

My standard line, when speaking on the phone with friends from rainier climates gloating that they have plenty of water, used to be: “Yep, the drought is so severe I am not allowed to wash my car.” Now they are talking about the “browning” of

California – you and I will be letting our lush, absurd-in-a-desert, lawns die.

Not to make light of this historic drought, and certainly not to make light of Climate Change – eight of the past nine years in San Diego are amongst the hottest and driest on record.

Nobody should have to die on account of the drought. Through eight years of record droughts, and we have so protected ourselves from the natural world that there will not be widespread famine in San Diego. The poverty stricken, who were hungry before the drought, will continue to be hungry, but nobody is talking about an increase in famine in San Diego.

Meanwhile, we have managed to greatly contain disease epidemics that at other times, and in other parts of the world, kill large numbers of people.

We have eliminated institutionalized




### Israel's Legacy of Immigration



Immigration is a part of our Jewish history. The term “wandering Jews” rose from both the expulsions and anti-Semitism Jews have suffered over the millennia and their innate and learned abilities to adapt. Many of us have ancestors that were forced to flee to new lands, from Spain, Russia and more recently from Hitler’s conquests in Europe.

At our recent Lights of Ohr Shalom event we re-counted the amazing journey of our very own Lou Dunst, who miraculously survived the Holocaust. He lost his childhood and his parents and could not return to his home. Where to go? Like so many, he fought unsuccessfully to get to Palestine. That was before Israel was founded.

Since 1948, with the establishment of a Jewish Homeland, Jews in need around the world have a country that belongs to them where they can go. And they have in recent times, from the far corners on Earth when war and anti-Semitism strike. Israel has opened its doors and settled them.

Today, anti-Semitism is on the rise in many places at an alarming rate. Jews are coming to Israel in record numbers. Immigration to Israel under its Law of Return increased in the first quarter of 2015 by 41 percent over the same period last year. More than half were from the former Soviet Union and a third were from Ukraine. Shockingly, the number of French olim, or Jewish immigrants, has risen dramatically. France in 2014 was for the first time Israel’s largest source of olim, due in large measure to rising levels of anti-Semitic violence. And British aliyah is also way up this year due to anti-Semitism.

I see the world as in perpetual chaos. A new century, and people are still fleeing war-torn areas and extreme poverty for a better existence. Risking their lives to get to a new country, they often arrive unwelcomed and illegally.

Fortunately, for us Jews, we have a Jewish Homeland. I thank God for Israel.

anti-semitism: it is now illegal to discriminate against Jews in housing, universities, and elsewhere.

I could go on and on about how much you and I are living the dreams that brought our parents, grandparents and ancestors to these shores in the twentieth, nineteenth, eighteenth, seventeenth or sixteenth centuries!

Now I have one deep question: so what are we going to do about it? Some have argued that this incredible, rapid, radical change in the human condition for us here has created a crisis of meaning. I don't agree. Our crisis is not about meaning, it is about understanding the incredible good fortune we have to live when and where we do, being grateful for our good fortune, and then living a life that transcends narcissism. How can we honor the gifts that we have been given by working to share our good fortune with others?

We have been very fortunate over the past few months to have two incredible teachers – Danny Siegel and Rabbi Marc Gitler – who have taught us, and, hopefully, inspired us to live part of our life in service to others. They have shown us possibilities of how our good fortune can help improve the fortune of others.

It's almost summer. There are more daylight hours. Many of us will take vacations. How many of those "extra" hours are we willing to give in service to others? How can we share so that others may enjoy the incredible blessings that have been given to us? How can we capitalize on this moment of nearly limitless possibilities to bring closer the day when all will share in its bounty?

### Chicken Shepherd's Pie

I made this shepherd's pie in the cast iron skillet I got for Mothers Day. It's made with chicken thighs, not ground beef. It takes a few steps to make, but the results are well worth it! Enjoy!

#### CHICKEN SHEPHERD'S PIE

##### Serves 6

2 pounds bone-in chicken thighs  
6 T Margarine cut in 6 pieces  
1 onion, chopped  
3 carrots, peeled, halved lengthwise and cut in 1/2 inch pieces  
2 garlic cloves, minced  
1 C diced mushrooms  
1 1/2 tsp thyme  
1/4 C sherry or white wine  
2 C chicken broth  
2 pounds russet potatoes, peeled and cut in 1 inch chunks  
1/4 C corn starch  
1 C frozen peas, thawed  
1 T lemon or lime juice  
1 large egg, lightly beaten

1. Season chicken with salt and pepper. Melt 1 T margarine in oven-safe 10- or 12-inch skillet over medium-high heat. Brown 5 minutes per side. Transfer chicken to plate.

2. Return skillet with chicken fat to medium-high heat, add carrots and onion, and cook 5 minutes til browned. Add garlic, mushrooms, and thyme and cook 1 minute. Add wine, cook 1 minute, and stir in broth.

3. Return chicken to skillet, skin side up, and bring to boil. Cover, reduce heat to medium-low, and simmer 14 minutes. Remove skillet from heat and transfer chicken to plate. When cool enough to handle, shred chicken into bite-sized pieces. Discard skin and bones.



4. Bring potatoes and 1 T salt to boil in large saucepan of water. Reduce heat and cook at strong simmer for 15 minutes. Drain and return to saucepan. Fold in butter, 1/4 tsp salt and pepper. Cover and set aside.

5. Adjust oven rack to upper middle position and set at 375 degrees. Whisk together cornstarch with 1/4 C water in small bowl. Bring skillet contents to boil and whisk in corn starch mixture. Stir til thickened, about 1 minute. Remove from heat, stir in peas, lemon juice, and chicken. Season with salt and pepper.

6. Spoon potatoes over entire surface of filling. Brush potatoes with egg. Transfer skillet to oven and bake 15 minutes til bubbly. Set oven to broil and cook til potatoes are golden-brown, 5-7 minutes.

7. Cool 15 minutes. Serve.


### Israel's Birthday



### An Israeli Judoka: Yael Arad

Summer is coming this month and I thought you might enjoy reading about a terrific athlete who competed in the 1992 Summer Olympiad in Barcelona, Spain. Her name is Yael Arad, one of the three top female judoka in the world at that time. She had previously won several medals in different world competitions and this time she was to prove herself a champion in the first ever Olympic competition for women's judo.

She had a few other things to prove. For 40 years, Israel had been sending athletes to the Olympic Games but not a single medal to show for it, and Yael believed it was up to her to change this while giving the Olympic world a new image of Israel's athletes. Instead of seeing coffins being carried from the Olympic Village, like in Munich in 1972, she wanted the world to see an Israeli athlete standing proudly on the medalists' platform under her country's blue and white flag. The message would be clear: "Look, everybody. Terrorists did not stop us. We're still here and we're strong and we're winners."

Her journey started 16 years earlier. As a child, she went to the Maccabee Tel Aviv sports club where she and her three brothers learned judo—a very popular sport in Israel then. She was the only female child to practice judo at that time.

In her own words: "What I like about judo is that it requires a combination of physical power and mental power. You have to think in order to win. You have to be stronger, smarter, and faster than your opponent." She also loves the artistry of the sport, with its ceremonial white uniforms and precision of movement.

By the time she was 10, she was Israel's junior champion, the best judoka in the under-fourteen category. Her coach declared that she was born to be a champion.

Her parents supported and encouraged her, allowing her to participate in international competitions abroad. She realized that to be a champion she needed to work hard, be extremely disciplined and make the extra effort necessary to achieve the top places.

People often asked what she had to give up, but she explains that while she did give up certain things, she gained other things. By 1990, she ranked seventh in Europe. Along the way, she finished high school, completed her military service and began studying nutrition at the Weizmann Institute of Science in Israel. But with the next Olympiad barely two years off, she knew she would have to train even harder to have a shot at a medal so she postponed her college studies and committed to full-time training.

In 1990 and 1991 she won bronze medals at judo competitions in Finland, Holland and Germany and silver medals in France, Scandinavia and Great Britain. Her first major international achievement was the bronze medal at the 1991 World Championship in Barcelona and she won the gold medal in the 1992 French Open in Paris. She found out she was representing Israel in many ways and discovered that she could be a kind of ambassador-at-large for a country often misunderstood in many parts of the world. She met athletes who knew almost nothing about life in Israel. Many had never before met anyone from her country and knew only what they saw on television: gunfire, bombings, stoning, ambushes, etc. To the world, Israelis were either soldiers with rifles or bearded men in black hats. So she presented a different picture and talked to them about everything, from wars and politics to popular music and lifestyles.

On July 30, 1992, Yael won the first silver medal for Israel in the Olympic



Games. Standing on the podium during the medal ceremonies, she thought of the Munich martyrs and decided right then she would cap Israel's victory by doing something especially for them.

In a press conference after the ceremony, she broke the silence. She told the world that this was the right moment to remember the eleven Israeli athletes and coaches who had been killed 20 years earlier in Munich and announced she was dedicating Israel's first Olympic medal to the victims and their families. In 20 years, no one at the Olympics had made public mention of the massacre. Now everyone was talking about it.

An editorial in the *Jerusalem Post* said:

"Yael Arad's modesty, her consciousness of the legacy of the massacre of the Israeli sportsmen at Munich twenty years ago and her visits to the victims' families on the eve of her departure for Barcelona make her more than just a talented sportswoman. She is a person of whom the nation can justly be proud."

I would add that not only the Israeli nation but all of us should be very proud of her.
