A Rainy Day is a Day of Creation

It was raining when I wrote this, so forgive me if it goes astray. But when I woke up this morning I could have sworn it was Creation Day¹. The Talmud teaches, in the name of Rabbi Chama the son of Rabbi Chaninah, that a rainy day is as great as the day of creation (Taanit 7b). Rabbi Chama teaches this through a quotation from the Prophet Isaiah (Is. 45:8): “Shower, O heavens, from above, and let the skies rain down righteousness; let the earth open, that redemption may spring up, and let it cause righteousness to sprout up also; I the LORD have created it.”

Rabbi Chama’s teaching connects the rain to creation by paying careful attention to the pronoun at the end of the verse. He highlights that Isaiah uses the singular pronoun “it” to refer to “rain,” a plural noun in Hebrew. So whereas the verse seems to imply that “rain” causes righteousness to sprout up, because of the use of the singular pronoun, Rabbi Chama reads the verse as saying that it is creation that will “cause righteousness to sprout up.”

This already is a lovely midrash about rain and creation, and about our ability to live the moment of creation even though none of us are quite that old. But Rabbi Chama’s teaching goes even deeper than that.

The rain that is falling in the Isaiah verse, the rain that makes this day as great as the day of creation, is the rain of righteousness. The grandeur of creation in the beginning is obvious, the world was created. The grandeur of this rainy day is as great as creation not only because the rain nurtures life, but the rain brings righteousness.

The verse goes even further still. The “skies rain down righteousness,” and in response to that, “let the earth open, that redemption may spring up.” Rain falls and the earth opens for life to blossom. Righteousness comes with the rain, and the earth opens to let redemption blossom.

This wonderful metaphor extends still one step further – because life-giving rain

Summer Arrives, but Lots Going On

Dear Congregants,

Traditionally, the period between Shavuot, June 11, and Selichot, September 24, is a time of “rest” at most synagogues. Congregants and Staff alike take their vacations, Religious School is on summer break, and programming is scaled back. The same is true at Ohr Shalom as there are no “major” events at the Shul.

But, if you look more closely, a lot will be going on that will affect the future of our beloved place:

1. While Rabbi Meltzer is on sabbatical, Sydni Adler a senior rabbinical student from Los Angeles will be joining us on Shevuot and then presiding over our services for the next nine weeks when Rabbi Meltzer is not available. She will also be preparing programming to present over each weekend and it will be delightful to host this talented young Rabbi-to-be.

2. The fire marshal has visited Ohr Shalom in May and given us criteria for what it would take to build out the second floor. Over the summer we will be doing the “donkey work” of cleaning out ten years of accumulated “stuff” from this area. It will

take a large work party. Stay tuned, as we will surely ask for volunteers.

3. The board will go through the always somewhat contentious task of making a budget. We always want to increase programming and services at Ohr Shalom and we have done so every year that I have been President. But programming cost money and so it is critical that we find places to save money as well, thus keeping dues at a reasonable level. This summer, the major focus will be on creating an early childhood education program with the goal of starting this fall. One source of savings will come from our utility bill where our recent conversion to solar power saves us more than \$500 per month.

This is a preview of what will be going on. Our Congregational Meeting is on June 5 which, hopefully, comes just after you receive this “Davar.” I hope you can all attend and I look forward to presenting our budget and discussing our plans.

Israelis Rank Among the Happiest in the World



The *Jerusalem Post* recently reported some facts about quality of life in Israel that may surprise you. The reporter, Dov Lipman, related that according to the World Happiness

Index, Israel is the 11th-happiest country in the world. That means its citizens are happier than those in the U.S. (13th place), the UK (23rd), France (32nd) and Italy (50th). In addition, Israel was named the fourth-best place in the world to raise children in the 2015 Family Life Index poll.

Here's another fact: in Israel, the safety index is far higher than the crime index: Tel Aviv 31.43 (crime) and 68.57 (safety); Jerusalem a remarkable 26.38 (crime) and 73.62 (safety). There is no doubt that this internal safety – despite the country's security challenges – plays a major role in Israelis being happier than many in the rest of the world and Israel being one of the best places to raise children.

Israel certainly has no shortage of people and families that are struggling on economic and personal levels. Despite this reality, a report released recently by the Health Ministry reveals that Israel's suicide rate ranks second-lowest among 28 European countries. It is also worth highlighting that the suicide rate among Israeli Arabs is lower than that of Jews.

What do you think is the secret to this happiness? Despite reports about Hamas drilling terror tunnels into Israel, and the ongoing threat of escalated violence, according to Lipman: every citizen plays a role in the continued survival of the Jewish people and in the contribution that Israel makes to our world. He believes that this sense of purpose and meaning is what feeds the feeling of happiness and satisfaction among Israel's citizens, despite the many challenges they face. We could learn from their successes.

Elegant, passionate, and filled with the love of God's creation, Abraham Joshua Heschel's *The Sabbath* has been hailed as a classic of Jewish spirituality

ever since its original publication -- and has been read by thousands of people seeking meaning in modern life. In this brief yet profound meditation on the meaning of the Seventh Day, Heschel introduced the idea of an "architecture of holiness" that appears not in space but in time. Judaism, he argues, is a religion of time: it finds meaning not in space and the material things that fill it but in time and the eternity that imbues it, so that "the Sabbaths are our great cathedrals."

KITCHEN BITES

Roasted Beet and Smoked Salmon Salad with Horseradish Mayo

Serves 4-6


- 2 lbs. beets - preferably red and golden combo
- 2 T extra virgin olive oil
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- 4 eggs
- 4 cups arugula or other greens
- 1 ripe avocado
- 8 oz thinly sliced smoked salmon
- Dressing
- 1/4 C mayo
- 1/4 C plain yogurt
- 2 T horseradish - bottled white or freshly grated
- 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
- 2 T finely chopped fresh dill

Wash beets well and peel only if necessary. Trim ends. Slice into 1/4-inch rounds. Arrange in single layer on parchment-paper-lined baking sheet. Drizzle with olive oil. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Roast at 425°F 30 to 35 minutes, til tender.

Add eggs to medium-sized saucepan of boiling water with 1 T salt. Bring back to boil. Cover and remove from heat. Let sit 8 to 10 minutes. Drain and cover with cold water. Crack shells, peel, and cut into quarters.

Prepare dressing by whisking all ingredients.

Arrange arugula over shallow serving bowl. Top with beet slices and eggs. Halve avocado, peel and slice into wedges, and arrange on salad with smoked salmon. Drizzle with dressing. Sprinkle with more dill if you like.

Summer Programs Off-Campus

San Diego Jewish Arts Festival (through July 17)

Offering something for everybody, the Arts Festival will be held at the Lyceum Theater in Horton Plaza and at various North County venues.

On Monday, June 6th, at 7:30 pm, you will be able to see and hear our own Yale Strom, with Hot Postrami, in *JewGrass*, a program of "mountain music" that will feature selections from the Jewish communities of the Carpathian Ukraine (Lou Dunst's birthplace). Yale will be accompanied by Barry Mitterhoff, Walt Richards, and the San Diego Jewish Men's Choir (Jack Cohen singing bass!).

On Saturday, Sunday and Tuesday, June 4th (8:45pm), 5th (7:00pm) and 7th (7:30pm), plan to attend the world premiere performance of *Gridlock*, a comedy (in English) set in a massive traffic backup, written by Ohr Shalom member, Solomon Maya and directed by Pepe Stepensky. The performances will be sponsored by the Ken Jewish Community and *L'Chaim Magazine*.

On June 8th, at 7:30, at the Lyceum Theater, and June 15th at 6:30 pm at the Encinitas Library, the Festival will present its *Seventh Annual Women of Valor* awards.

Tuesday, June 14th, at 7:30 pm, Dr. Richard Lederer, noted linguist, will be at the Lyceum Theater for *The Joys and Oys of Language*.

North County events will include a performance of Golda's Balcony, a one-woman show that had a long run on Broadway, May 27th to June 26th at the New Village Arts Theater, and a new play, *A Jewish Joke*, by Phil Jonson and Marni Freedman, at the North County Rep on June 20th and 21st.

The Festival, which will run until July 17th, will include many more wonderful events – including performances at the Lyceum Theater, from July 6th to 17th, of *Maestro*, Hershey Felder's homage to Leonard Bernstein. A new play, *Camp David*, offers a you-are-there view of a great historical achievement whose legacy continues to resonate nearly 40 years later. In the tumultuous 1970s, Middle East peace seemed as remote a prospect as it does today. Yet during 13 extraordinary days in 1978, two world leaders, Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, under the watchful and sometimes exasperated eyes of U.S. President Jimmy Carter and his wife Rosalynn, hammered out an agreement that inspired the entire world. Pulitzer Prize winner Lawrence Wright (*The Looming Tower*, HBO's *Going Clear*) brings us a riveting and moving story filled with humor, insight, and surprises as three very different men, each devoutly committed to his people and also to his faith, find that peace is possible and that hope is always the better choice. falls, and life blossoms, the new life that blossoms, will bring even more life. So too, as the righteousness that descends to earth, causes redemption to blossom, and the blossoming of that redemption will lead to the sprouting of even more righteousness.

The rain feeds the circle of life, and the descending of righteousness from on high leads to an ever increasing flow of righteousness in our world.

We are now in the period of the Omer, counting the days until Shavuot. We are counting forward towards that day when we are linked to creation – the world is created through Torah – and when we are linked to our responsibility to carry that Torah and vision of righteousness into the world. Shavuot is the great rainy day – that is both all about creation, and all about creating a world of righteousness.

Isaiah and Rabbi Chama understood that rain brings life, and the rain of God's blessing must bring righteousness. We are the inheritors of the created world, of Isaiah and of Rabbi Chama. We are preparing ourselves to stand at Mount Sinai and receive the Torah, as righteousness raining upon us.

Let us all join together to receive that blessing, and to create our lives as lives of righteousness. Let us speak and act every day as a medium through which that rain becomes real in our world. Let that righteousness which motivates us be a force for redemption in our own lives and in the lives of every person on this earth.

May it be Your will, the One who creates the world and causes the rain to fall, to allow us to receive the rain of righteousness from above and to let the earth and all of us open up to it that redemption for all may spring up.

I look forward to celebrating with you at Shavuot.

'The opening line of this "Rabbi's Message" is an allusion to the opening line of Prince's song "1999." Though I do not hold up Prince as a paragon of virtue, his talent, his insights and his social critique will be missed by many, myself included. May his memory be a source for inspiration, and an impetus to stir us up from our complacency with the status quo.


Ohr Shalom Sisterhood Road Trip L.A. Triple Art Experience

Dame Stephanie "Steve" Shirley



In May we commemorated Yom Hashoah and I found the name of a woman who survived the Holocaust because she was one of the 10,000 children rescued via the kindertransport. She grew up to be an amazing lady who has

helped thousands of women by providing them with jobs that allowed them to grow and take care of their families at the same time. She is known as Dame Stephanie "Steve" Shirley.

Stephanie was born on September 16, 1933 in Dortmund, Germany as Vera Buchthal. Her mother was not Jewish but her father was. In 1939, as the Nazi power grew, he sent Vera and her sister Renate on the *kindertransport* to England. Vera was taken to Salton Colfield, England. After finishing her studies at a convent school, she attended the Osiwestry Girls' High School to study mathematics. After completing her studies, she decided not to go to university

but look for a job in a mathematics/technical field – the only choice she had was to study botany because she was a woman.

When she turned 18, she became a British citizen and changed her name to Stephanie Brook but adopted the name "Steve" to help her in the male dominated business world. For six years, she worked at Dollis Hills building computers from scratch and writing code in machine language while taking evening classes to get a mathematics degree. In 1959, she joined CDL.

In 1962, she married physicist Derek Shirley and founded Freelance Programmers, Ltd. with a £6 investment. Later the company became Xansa, a unique business model outsourcing all of its software development to women software developers working from home. Originally, the company targeted women who had dependents to help them. Later, the company provided all of its independent women programmers with the opportunity to work while improving on their education and further development. Her staff and team projects included programming the Concorde's black box flight recorder.

"Steve" had a son, Giles, who was autistic. This prompted her to work in favor of

developing resources to supporting autism. Her company was also engaged in helping out other emerging technologies.

She was the founder of the British Computer Society and was appointed Officer of the Order of the British Empire (OBE), and in 2000, she was promoted to Dame Commander of the OBE. Between May 2009 and May 2010, she was UK's Ambassador for Philanthropy as the Shirley Foundation had contributed over £50 million to different charities.

"Steve" was awarded the Mountbatten Medal and the Freedom of the City of London. She was also appointed Fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineers. She was granted Honorary Doctorates from the University of Birmingham and 23 other English universities in addition to 4 more Scottish universities.

She also served as an independent non executive director for Tandem Computers, Inc., the Atomic Energy Authority and the John Lewis Partnership.

Today, she is still very active in her philanthropic work. What a great Dame!

Social Action Corner

“Most of the things worth doing in the world have been declared impossible before they were done” – Justice Louis Brandeis

An idea that has been around since at least the 13th century in Western thought is that reason and faith can co-exists as two different ways of discovering truth. The reasoned approach seems more intelligible, because it derives truths from other knowns that are based in sensory perception. Fundamental truths are known based on our own experience in the world (I drop something from my hand and it falls downward), and from these other truths can be derived through reason. A reason-adherent person can work out for themselves that there might be some truths that reason cannot detect, because there may be no way of perceiving some truths. Contrarily, faith does not ask anything of us but to believe, on faith, without using our powers of reason to find proofs. The reason-lover would look at this type of thinking as flawed. Personally I have my doubts about how good most of us are at reasoning to find out the truth all of the time. Even the most devout reasoners are continually relying on their faith in their memory, their faith in their powers of reason, their faith that the truths that they “know” are actually true. Through a Jewish world view we have some easy choices: we can debate the merits of an act of loving kindness on rational, moralistic grounds through our powers of reason, or we can perform *Tikkun Olam* as a demonstration of devotional faith in the fulfilling of a mitzvah. Either way the act occurs, the world is repaired, though action based simply on faith can often be more expedient.

What does it matter if we are expedient or not? In some cases it doesn't matter, but in others it can mean alleviation of suffering to be quick about our efforts to repair the world. We read in Torah that Abraham did this when travelers arrived at his tent. He literally *ran* to serve the strangers within his own tent with baked goodies and washing their feet. Using that example, I suggest we run to the next social action event to clean up a beach or feed a poor family or cloth an immigrant! Just be careful, and wear the right shoes. Seriously folks, I caused an evulsion fracture a couple weeks ago to my ankle from wearing the wrong shoes just walking.
