## The World Is Complicated and Beautiful – Now Come and Study

We have entered a New Year – we entered 5777 a few months ago at Rosh HaShanah, and now we are entering 2017. We live in two fundamentally distinct ways to mark time, to acknowledge history, to identify who we are. We locate today, even our very lives, on the Jewish Calendar and on the secular calendar. We acknowledge the date as overtly Jewish and sacred, since “God created the world,” and as part of our universal, shared marking of time in the “Common Era.” The former identifies as part of our particular people, religion, tradition, the latter as part of something less particular, more universal.

The world we live in, beyond simply identifying the date, is also polysemic – has many possible ways in which it can be understood; or more correctly, many possible ways through which we try to understand it, knowing that Absolute Comprehension is beyond the ken of mortals.

New Years, or should I say January 1, or this year, should I say Tevet 3, annually gives us an opportunity to reflect on just how much this world exists beyond all simple, reductionist attempts to define it, and yet, inspires us to study it, with some fantastic hope that someday it may make sense to us.

So as we enter the New Year again (in a span of only three months), let us all be inspired to learn more about our world and our lives.

Let me use this as an opportunity to announce that we will again be participating in the **iEngage: Engaging Israel** series through the Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem. This year, we will be engaging: “The Tribes of Israel: A Shared Homeland for a Divided People.” We will be studying “the challenge of creating a Jewish and democratic public space in the modern State of Israel—a shared common space for a people divided along ‘tribal’ affiliations: religious, ideological, national, and geographic.”

Last year, the **iEngage** class brought together about twenty people each week. This year, as we did last year, we will watch an engaging video lecture from one of the outstanding scholars from the Shalom Hartman Institute, then study Jewish texts related to the subject and engage in a meaningful discussion of the topic, informed by the texts of our people. We even serve a light lunch.

The **iEngage** class will meet on

### All Contributions Matter!

Dear Congregants,

Every year the board and I struggle with the appropriate tone and form of our fundraising efforts. It is a fact of life that we need to raise fairly large sums of money to balance our budget. These healthy amounts of money can only be raised by focusing on those of us who are fortunate enough to have reasonable amounts of disposable income. Simply put, a successful fundraising campaign relies heavily on larger donors

As a result, many people who would gladly give smaller amounts find no place on the pledge cards that suits their budget and may feel that their donations are either not wanted, not needed, or have no impact. Actually, nothing could be further from the truth.

There are a number of enrichment programs in the synagogue that have been added over the past few years that make our synagogue vital and cost us between \$1000 and \$5000 dollars. There are several more programs we would like to offer that cost in the same range. We have social action projects that cost much less.

It is the hundreds of small donations that we receive throughout the year that make these programs possible and we have a couple of very attractive opportunities for people who would wish to give. For example:

- Our new prayer books may be donated in the name of a loved one or a family for \$90. Such a contribution will result in a dedication being placed inside the front cover of the book.
- An Oneg or Kiddush can be sponsored for \$72. Any donation, in any amount and for any purpose is welcome and is recognized in the next monthly "Davar."

Every congregant is important and every donation is important. This year at Kol Nidre we raised more money than ever before – \$92,000. Yet, it is my sense that we must reach the \$100,000 goal each year to ensure our financial stability. Small donors can easily make up the difference. *All donations matter. You matter!*

I hope, if you are able, that you will come and explore iEngage with us, beginning Wednesday, January 18. If you are planning on attending the first class, please let the office know so we will know how many to expect for lunch. As we enter this New Year (2017), and as we enter the second quarter of this year (5777), let us do so as a community committed to our diversity, our genuine interest and care for all those around us, and may be blessed to sit together, joyful, engaged and challenged, and study this marvelous, complicated, multi-faceted world we call home.



## Sharing My Personal Israel Experience

Eli and I just returned from Israel and our hearts and minds are still integrating the wonderful things we saw and did. We went for an international allergy conference, combined with visiting sites, friends and family.

We began with a 2-day Interfaith Galilee group tour created by two physician members of *Allergists for Israel*: one, a true Jewish advocate of Israel, and the other allergist an ordained minister. Our drive north from Jerusalem on Highway 6 cut a path separating Israel and many neighboring West Bank communities. Seeing how the Palestinian and Israeli towns exist together in such a scattered fashion demonstrated to me how complicated their borders are.

We traveled along Lake Kinneret, visiting several important churches and shared their biblical pasts through the perspective of our Christian travelers. This was seeing Israel differently and reminded us first-hand how holy and significant Israel is to non-Jews as well. Next we went to the tomb of the physician/scholar Maimonides, tucked in an obscure location in Nazareth. The Haredi oversee the sight with a mechitza across the tomb. We were sad that, unlike many Jewish historically important landmarks, the resting place of this monumental Jewish sage had been neglected.

We stayed overnight at Shaar Hagolan, a kibbutz within sight of the borders with Jordan and Syria. Established in the 1930's, their location was strategic to defense in the War of Independence. Our guide told stories about that time and her years growing up there in the kibbutz's child-group home.

Day 2 brought us to a baptism spot on the River Jordan, a highlight for our Christian travelers. Together we recited quotes from the New Testament, then Eli led us in "Michael Row Your Boat Ashore." Our final stop was my favorite, the charming town of Tzefat, and birthplace of Kabbalah. We visited the Joseph Caro Synagogue, viewed the colorful residents and witnessed an amazing sunset. Heading back to Jerusalem, as we sang Hebrew songs, I was warmed with a deep spiritual presence.

Over the next few days we savored our time in Jerusalem, re-uniting with family and friends, exploring the vast art and artifacts at the Israel Museum, enjoying the market on Ben Yehuda and ending our visit at the Kotel on Erev Shabbat. I was especially attracted to the children, seeing how they grow up living their Judaism. We saw groups learning at the museum, praying with their parents at the Kotel and gathering for Shabbat dinner at our hotel. I reflected on similarities to Ohr Shalom's Shabbat Kehillatit.

I know many of our congregants have visited Israel. Most agree that a trip there feels like going home. I hope my account stirs your own memories and inspires you, whether you have gone there or not yet made the trip. Dream of visiting Eretz Yisrael. There is nowhere like it in the world. *L'Hitraot.*

### Crustless Spinach Pie

When I was in Scottsdale, Arizona, recently, a dear friend that I grew up with in Michigan invited me for brunch. She served a delicious spinach pie without a crust. It was so perfect for low carb and gluten free eaters. She served it with juice, tea, fresh fruit and muffins. This could be your next easy breakfast, brunch, or afternoon tea. I've served it twice since I got home and my guests always request the recipe.

I used fresh organic baby spinach that I steamed, then chopped, the night before. I also used whole wheat flour and cremini mushrooms. The recipe works well either way. I also baked it in an attractive quiche dish. Enjoy!

### Crustless Spinach Pie (serves 6)

- 2 T flour
- 1/2 stick butter or margarine, softened
- 3 large eggs
- 1 lb container cottage cheese
- 1 pkg frozen, chopped spinach
- 2 C sliced mushrooms
- 1 C grated cheddar cheese

Set oven to 350°F. Grease an 8x8 dish or similar size baking dish. Blend flour, butter, and eggs first, then mix in the remaining ingredients. Bake for one hour and cool slightly before serving.



This 1983 remake of the famous 1942 film of the same name, which starred Jack Benny and Carol Lombard, stars Brooks and his wife, Anne Bancroft. The story takes place at the time of the German invasion of Poland, and centers around a group of Jewish Polish actors, whose star, Frederick Bronski (Brooks), thinks himself an impresario of the first order. The story tells the tale of how they, and a number of Jewish partisans who they are hiding in their theater, manage to escape from the Nazis after they take control of Warsaw. Roger Ebert in his 3 out of 4 star review says, "Bronski is an all-over-the-map guy who does Hamlet's soliloquy and stars in a revue called 'Naughty Nazis' in the same night and on the same stage. . . . Brooks and Bancroft cheerfully allow farce, slapstick, pratfalls and puns into the story, until the whole movie seems strung together like one of the revues in Bronski's theater. . . . Brooks combines a backstage musical with a wartime romance and comes up with an eclectic comedy that races off into several directions, usually successfully." The movie also stars Charles Durning and Jose Ferrer. The film is suitable for teenagers.


