## The Future of Judaism

Rabbi Sydni Adler is coming back as our intern, for the summer and for the coming year. More on that later.

We are a people who have always had an eye, a hope and, perhaps, a developing ulcer directed to the future. From the very beginning, as we tell the story, God had a vision of the future to be fulfilled by human beings: Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth. When God made the covenant with Abraham God promised him the land of Israel and that his descendants would be as numerous as sand on the shore and stars in the sky.

Our classic rabbis, legalists, moralists and mystics, had a vision of a future in which the Jewish people would know blessings and the whole world would know peace and food security. The rabbis of the modern people believed that the enlightenment would lead to the social and political emancipation of us Jews, and would lead to a world of peace and prosperity. The early Zionists imagined a future in which the Jewish people would return to the Land of Israel, create the State of Israel, and develop a peaceful, just, vibrant society.

Reading the previous paragraph, I can't help but smile knowing that we have shared learning opportunities engaging thinkers and writers of each of those visions of the Jewish future in the classes here at Ohr Shalom.

Over the month of May, we also have been studying and discussing the present state of American Jewry and thinking, hopeful and dour, about our future. We have

studied demographic data, responses to that demographic data, and some commentators' thoughts about our future.

We have spoken frankly, personally, and at times painfully, about how we understand the current situation and our prospects for the future. Those around the table, represent a group of curious, reflective and insightful adults who want to learn from our past, analyze our present and ponder our future. (They are also a group that has the wonderful privilege of being available to attend classes at the synagogue on weekdays during the day!)

I want to invite everybody into the conversation about our Jewish present and our Jewish future. The opportunities are nearly endless. These ideas are in the background or explicitly part of everything we do – classes, discussions, Shabbat Lunch table talk, Ask the Rabbi, and so much more!

I also want to invite you to help shape our Jewish future by engaging our returning Rabbinic Intern, Sydni Adler. Rabbi Adler has completed her year in Israel, and is returning to the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies to complete her final two years.

Wonderfully for us and thanks to our Board of Directors, Rabbi Adler will be at Ohr Shalom most of the Shabbatot of the summer while I am away, and will be here for the holidays and about twice a month during the coming year. Rabbi

### FUTURE BUDGETS: SHARING THE LOAD

Dear Congregants,

I'd like to talk to you today about something that has been bothering me. The hint is in the title above!

During the past five years that I've served as President, we've made great strides in producing a balanced budget each year and managing to always be "in the black." But we still have year-to-year struggles, and the necessity of raising money is never off of the agenda. I'm still not comfortable that we are doing everything we can do to be the best that we can be.

The thing that bothers me the most is, that when it comes to giving donations, we don't share the load. Now, I hope you understand that the money we raise from dues only accounts for half of our expenses. In this, we are the same as every other synagogue. Synagogues all depend on fundraising to fill the gaps in their budget. Without adequate fundraising, all synagogues would close.

So fundraising is a necessity for "life" and if we all don't give our share, somebody else has to pay for us. This is a fact of life.

We are a congregation of approximately 340 members. Each year, at Kol Nidre, we receive only 140 donations. Fully 200 members do not contribute.

I don't know that we are any different from any other congregations, but I know we can be better and I know that we **MUST** be better if we are ever going to be able to run the synagogue without fear for the future.

I don't know why 200 members chose not to make a Kol Nidre Pledge. Believe me, if everybody participated, the donations would not have to be large to make a huge difference. This coming year, I urge you to take yourself off of that particular list.

The Torah commands that we give a portion of what we have. Giving is not an option for those who wish to live a Jewish life, regardless of circumstances. I hope that in 5778 more of us will recognize the responsibility to be a part of the survival of Ohr Shalom, forever.

### RABBI'S MESSAGE CONT.

Adler will be involved in all aspects of synagogue life as a rabbi. In particular, she will be instrumental in helping us further develop our Early Childhood Program. With Rabbi Adler's help, we will be restarting a once-a-month Friday night program for nursery school aged children and their families, as well as a once-a-month Saturday morning program for the same children and their families. She will also serve as the Youth Director for our Kadima Youth Group, working with children in grades 4-6, alongside Jessica Lemoine.

Besides all the learning and joy you will reap by engaging Rabbi Adler, you will also have an influence on the Jewish future through all the great things that she will go forward to accomplish. I invite you this summer, and during the coming year, to receive what Rabbi Adler will bring into our community, and to give to her a wonderful experience of meaningful Jewish living within a loving, nurturing, learning, challenging Conservative synagogue!

This is a great year to plan to be even more involved and active at Ohr Shalom, and with your involvement, as well as Rabbi Adler's presence, we will together make this another step forward towards a future in which we will be blessed to see the promise of peace, food security, and an ever-changing and ever-thriving Jewish community!

I look forward to welcoming Rabbi Adler back on Shabbat, June 9-10, and to sharing the blessings of the future we are creating, all of us, together.

When I return to a place or community where I have spent meaningful time, I often think of the statement from Pirkei Avot: "Ben Bag-Bag

said: 'Turn it and turn it, for everything is in it.' " In context, Ben Bag-Bag's statement refers to Torah, that Torah contains more and more substance each time one dives into it from a different perspective. I find that spending time with communities again and again has a similar effect. Each time I meet an individual or group of people in a different context or at a different point in time, I feel that I can learn more about them, and thus, more about the Torah of the world. Last summer, I was overwhelmed with joy as I met the community of Ohr Shalom – its warmth, friendliness, and passion for experiencing Judaism. Now, I am excited to return to Ohr Shalom as the Rabbinic Intern for the coming year and to learn more about the beautiful individuals that make up this community.

This summer, I look forward to participating in services, leading Lunch and Learn sessions, and leading a session of Readings With the Rabbinic Intern again. From all of the wisdom and laughter that I experienced just from the kids that I met last summer, I cannot wait to delve into Jewish learning and living with all of the Ohr Shalom kids that I have yet to meet.

With your honesty, constant caring, and curiosity about every aspect of Judaism, you truly made me feel at home last summer. I look forward to "turning" the Ohr Shalom community again, finding more and more within it with each conversation, each holiday, and each life cycle event. ## Some Thoughts on the Priestly Blessing

Among the many interesting tidbits of commentary in our new *siddurim* (prayer books) are the two paragraphs about the *Birkat Kohanim*, or priestly blessing. We don't say this blessing silently in our personal *Amidah*, but the leader does during the repetition. You all know this one. It's translated in our *siddur*:

*May Adonai bless and protect you*  
*May Adonai's countenance shine upon you and may Adonai bestow kindness upon you.*  
*May Adonai's countenance be lifted toward you and may Adonai grant you peace.*

Whether or not we believe as they did in the ancient world that blessings had real magical powers to change our lives, these are delightful words. We place our hands on the heads of our children before Shabbat dinner and recite these beautiful words with sincere hope in our hearts that our children will be blessed

and protected and the countenance of God will shine upon them and grant them peace.

Our new *siddur* tells us that Aaron learned from the Torah to recite this blessing to his descendants – the priests. According to the teachings of Rabbi Hillel, we should all be like the students of Aaron. Rabbi Hillel taught: "Be like the students of Aaron: Loving peace and pursuing peace, loving every living being and drawing them near to the Torah. What would Aaron do? When two people were fighting with each other, he would go and sit near the first and say, 'My child, you should only know how disturbed and embarrassed your friend is about having offended you,' and thus his anger would be quieted. Then Aaron would go to the second one, sit next to him and say, 'My child, I've just spoken with your friend and you should realize how disturbed and embarrassed he is about having offended you.' And Aaron would sit with him until his anger had dissipated. When the two met, they would hug each other and kiss."

I like to think of all these things during the repetition of the *Amidah* on Shabbat morning when the person praying aloud chants this blessing and the congregation responds: "*ken y'hi ratzon!*", or so may it be God's will.

## KITCHEN BITES

### Shortbread and Lemon Curd Bars

I happen to love shortbread cookies and everything lemon. So this very easy-to-make recipe is perfect. The lemon is in lemon curd. I buy mine at Trader Joe's. The recipe calls for a sprinkling of powdered sugar as the final step, but I prefer fresh raspberries. You can get very creative with this delicious shortbread. Covered with plastic wrap, it will last at least four days in the fridge. Enjoy!

#### Shortbread and Lemon Curd Bars (makes 16 bars)

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup packed dark brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) chilled unsalted butter, cut into small pieces
- 1 cup Lemon Curd, chilled
- Confectioners' sugar for dusting

Position a rack in the center of the oven and preheat to 350°F. Grease or spray an 8-inch square baking pan.

Whisk together the flour, brown sugar, and salt in a medium bowl. Break up any lumps.

Cut the butter with a pastry blender or two butter knives used scissor fashion, until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs.

Knead the dough (squeeze with your fingers) until it comes together like a pie crust. Transfer the dough to the baking pan and press into the bottom. Bake for 20 minutes, or until light golden brown. Let cool in the pan on a wire rack.

Spread the Lemon Curd over the crust. Refrigerate, loosely covered, until ready to serve. Just before serving, lightly sift confectioners' sugar over the Lemon Curd and cut the cookies into 2-inch squares. Store in air tight container if they are not all eaten in one sitting.



### Simone Veil, French Politician



As politics in France have become more and more controversial because of the candidates and their political ideologies, I would like to pay homage to a truly great French Jewish politician. Her name is Simone Veil (pronounced Vay).

Simone was born in Nice in 1927, the daughter of André Jacob and Yvonne Steinmetz. In 1944, after graduating the *Lycée* she, her sister and her mother were sent to Auschwitz. Her mother died of typhus, but Simone and her sister were sent to Bergen Belsen and were liberated by the British in 1945.

After the war, Simone studied law and political science at the Institute for Political Studies in Paris, where she met Antoine Veil. They married in 1946 and had three sons. Eventually, Simone got her law degree, hoping to be a trial lawyer, and in 1956 she qualified as a magistrate. In 1957 she

became an attaché with the Ministry of Justice, where she worked for 17 years helping to draft reform legislation related to prison administration and social measures affecting mental patients and adopted children.

Between 1970 and 1974 she was secretary general of the High Council of the Magistrature and served in the administrative council of the Office of French Radio and Television.

Simone was appointed Minister of Health, the first woman to hold full Cabinet rank since 1848. Her first major task was to defend the bill to legislate birth control devices. She then tackled another bill allowing abortions during the first ten weeks of pregnancy. The bill was adopted in 1974 and France became the first Catholic country with legalized abortion.

Simone, a heavy smoker, reduced her smoking by half and stopped smoking in public; she promoted the distribution of contraceptive devices and improving maternity services for the poor; she championed a sharp increase in social security taxes. No one seemed to hold it against her and she was France's most

popular political figure, even if she did not belong to any one political party.

In 1979 she led President Giscard's party slate in the election of the French delegation to the European Parliament. During the campaign she advocated further European integration and a larger effort to deal with problems such as the environment, employment and women's rights. When she was elected to the European Parliament, she resigned as Minister of Health, and shortly thereafter was elected President of the European Parliament, a position she held until 1982.

She never affiliated with the women's liberation movement in France. In her words, "Sexual liberation doesn't help a woman if she hasn't got economic liberation... psychological liberation."

Simone continued to serve as Minister of Health until 1994. Some believed she could be president of France but she wasn't so sure. In 1995 she said: "Only 6% of Parliament is female. We may be equal on paper but the reality is very different."

What a terrific woman and human being.

Many consider this family-centered film – a comedy with dramatic issues – to be one of the best Israeli films of all time. The film tells the story of a 17-year-old boy who is the glue that holds his dysfunctional, but loving, family together. Shlomi cleans house, takes care of his aging grandfather, tries to keep his brother out of trouble and cooks gourmet meals for his family.

The L.A. Times reviewer said, “Where writer-director Shemi Zarhin excels in offhanded human comedy – in the craziness

that comes with being a teenager in a house full of lunatics to whom you’re related. Zarhin has a fine ear for dialogue with refreshing directness and loud rings of truth, but he also knows when to let looks speak volumes.”

When Shlomi’s math teacher discovers that Shlomi has a rare mathematical gift, he wants Shlomi to change schools so that he can use his special skill. Since Shlomi does so much for his family, he’s not sure he can leave them. And his family isn’t sure they want him to go. He’s never had much interest or time for his school work and isn’t sure he can, or wants to, handle the harder school, and, besides he’s more preoccupied with his girlfriend and his efforts to move their relationship to the next level. Come see how things get resolved.

The movie is Hebrew and French, with English subtitles. It is suitable for older teens.

### CAARI: JNF’s Unique Program to Experience Israel Hands-On

There are many ways to travel to Israel during a lifetime. Entire families go together to share a first time with their children. The families of many Bar/Bat Mitzvah-age children celebrate this occasion at the Western Wall. Teens often go on organized Jewish trips in the summer. And, of course, Birthright has provided the opportunity for a 10-day trip to Israel at no cost to first-time visitors ages 18-26.

*What about older adults?* There happens to be a comprehensive program through Jewish National Fund (JNF) called CAARI: Canadian American Active Retirees in Israel. This unique travel program is designed specifically for active retirees or semi-retirees (50 plus). CAARI is more than a touring program. Now in its 35th year, CAARI volunteers can stay from two to seven weeks and experience tours throughout the country, take part in community service programs, plus enjoy a speakers’ component to help develop an appreciation and knowledge of the country, its people, history and the work of JNF.

In the CAARI program you will travel throughout the country to museums, kibbutzim, wineries, farms, agricultural research centers, archeological sites, and JNF forests and projects. You will also meet people from all walks of life, volunteering in hospitals, community agencies, public schools and universities. In the evenings you will hear lecturers such as archeologists, rabbis, Ethiopian immigrants, economists and Israeli Defense Soldiers discussing issues, politics, finance and culture, too. Last year, Ohr Shalom members Mark and Elaine Smith participated in CAARI and reported they were thrilled and inspired with all aspects of the trip. They want to share their experiences.

The CAARI program is directed to a specific population of retirees. Within Ohr Shalom we have many members who not only are eligible but may be interested in joining such an in-depth Israel experience. JNF’s CAARI has a long track record, and the 2018 program will likely be outstanding.

On June 15th at 6:45pm, Ohr Shalom will host an evening with the Director of CAARI, Susan Horwitz, who will be in San Diego to discuss the program and present the details of their tours. Descriptions will include stories from former attendees such as Mark and Elaine. Please join us.
