REACHING THE MULTITUDES

Last month we celebrated together the festival of Shavuot – the holiday that marks the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai. Many people associate the day with the stone tablets given to Moses on top of the mountain, or with God dictating the entire Torah to Moses. Neither of these are the sacred memory of this holiday.

Shavuot is the day, according to the tradition, when we were all gathered at the foot of the mountain and God delivered words of Torah directly into the ears of every single Jew. In the *midrash*, this extends not only to the Jews who had just left Egypt a month-and-a-half earlier, but to every single Jew of all time – including all of those who had lived and died before that moment, and all of us who were born after that moment. Every single Jew stood together and heard the voice at the same time.

It is the single, great, mass revelatory experience of the entire TaNaKh (Bible), and even of all of Jewish history.

Think about what it means to have a message that instantly reaches hundreds of thousands, even millions, of people. At the time of Mount Sinai there was almost no writing, nor books. People could only be heard depending

on how loud they could scream.

A quick survey of the development of technology for sharing a message rapidly with a large number of people, spread over a great distance: shofar blasts from outpost to outpost, smoke signals, messenger on horseback, printing press, movable type printing press, telegraph, telephone, radio, television . . . my smartphone.

It is now possible to reach vast numbers of people in almost no time. That the development of this technology over time has serious implications for our society should be obvious. It is interesting that the new vocabulary around such technology includes vocabulary from our sacred tradition (as we SCROLL on our TABLETS, many of them with a logo of a piece of fruit often associated with the Garden of Eden with a bite missing) and also from epidemics and catastrophes (as when I got FLAMED by the message that went VIRAL).

At Ohr Shalom we are constantly looking at ways to improve how technology can help foster and strengthen our community, and how

A Prayer for Those Who Serve the Community

Rabbi Sydni Adler's acceptance of a position as spiritual leader of Agudath Achim Synagogue in Shreveport, Louisiana, made real for me the fact that the American South abounds with small Jewish communities. Some southern cities – notably Miami and Atlanta – rank as thriving Jewish centers, and others (e.g., Dallas, Houston, Jacksonville, New Orleans) sustain respectable populations. A 2018 survey found that the 13 Southern States have a total Jewish population of 1.05 million. However, only about half of those Jews live in the larger cities. The others are spread far and wide, residing in a myriad of smaller places such as Shreveport, where, among a total population of 199,311, there are about 1,000 Jews.

Since 2000, the small Jewish communities of the South have received critical life support from the Goldring/Woldenberg Institute of Southern Jewish Life (ISJL). Based in Jackson, Mississippi, the ISJL employs itinerant rabbis who periodically lead Shabbat, Holiday and life-cycle services at synagogues too small to employ full-time clergy. Teams of ISJL Educational Fellows consult with the more than 70 Southern congregations that implement its religious school curriculum, and Community Engagement Fellows support social action programming. The ISJL's Museum of the Southern Jewish Experience holds archives and publishes journals, documenting every Southern Jewish community. It also sponsors Jewish cultural events, such as lectures, films and a literary series. The ISJL website extols "the Southern Jewish story: Of small communities still vibrant, of new Jewish communities still small but growing in strength and numbers... of pride of place."

The ISJL's mission would be fruitless, and Southern Jewish life would falter, were it not for individuals in local communities who lovingly shoulder the burden of keeping synagogues alive.

Dr. Edith Grossman Mayers was such a person. A sister of longtime Ohr Shalom member Sherry Berlin, Edye Mayers died at age 74 on May 28, 2019, in Lafayette, Louisiana. Edye, who was

brought up Orthodox in New Orleans, retired last year after 30 years as Associate Professor of Education at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette.

A renowned teacher and mentor, Edye also spent decades on the boards of social betterment agencies, notably Faith House, a home for battered women and their children, and the Jaycees and the Junior League, both national leadership development organizations. These, and others, gave Edye their highest service awards.

Other than her husband and three children, Edye's deepest life commitment was to sustaining Jewish life in Acadiana, the southwestern "Cajun" region of Louisiana, of which Lafayette, population 126,848, is the hub. Edye held every possible position on the Board of Lafayette's only synagogue, Temple Shalom, a Reform congregation with 60 families. She was President several times. She was Religious School Principal. She organized Shabbat services, which she often led because there is no permanent rabbi. Edye hosted synagogue-wide Seders and chaired the Building Fund Committee. As a spokesperson for the Jewish community, she lectured widely to interdenominational groups and often appeared on TV.

For years, Edye and her fellow Temple Shalom congregants worked to build an endowment, with a goal of \$2 million, to fund the salary of a full-time rabbi. The fund got its start nearly 15 years ago with \$1 million in proceeds from the sale of synagogue-owned property. While Temple Shalom was building its endowment, Edye and others persuaded Hebrew Union College to send Rabbinic Interns to Acadiana, so that the congregations in Lafayette and Lake

WORDS FROM THE PRESIDENT CONT.

Charles periodically would experience professional spiritual leadership. In Lafayette, the Interns enjoyed room and board – and mentorship in sustaining community cohesiveness – at Edye’s house. After her death, several commented that she had been one of their most valued teachers.

Early in 2019, Edye was diagnosed with CJD, a rare brain degenerative disease. Knowing that her time was short, she instructed her children “I don’t want pity. I want a project.” The rabbi endowment fund now was only \$80,000 short of its goal, so she charged her family and community with raising that amount in her honor. Immediately they launched “Edye’s Project,” which has collected, over the past weeks, more than \$10,000. (Edye’s Rabbi Project, PO Box 53711, Lafayette, LA 70505).

Following the Torah reading every Shabbat morning, we offer *A Prayer for Those Who Serve the Community*. We request blessings for people who work to sustain Jewish life everywhere, “along with those who devote themselves to establish synagogues for prayer... and those who provide for their maintenance.” The next time you rise to recite this, think of our fellow Jews in small towns and cities throughout the South, and remember Edye Mayers.

RABBI’S MESSAGE CONT.

communication is part of that. At the risk of stating the obvious, you are reading the monthly Davar right now.

The next stage in our communication evolution will be two distinct forays into the ubiquitous world of text messaging. Though I am going to describe both of them together, please understand them as two distinctly separate new uses of technology.

Weekly Text Messages: These are for communication. Before the High Holy Days we will begin using text messaging as a way to communicate what is happening at Ohr Shalom directly to those who have a cell phone that receives text messages. We will send one or two text messages each week. One on Thursday, with the schedule for Shabbat and the weekend, candle lighting times and perhaps an additional brief thought. We may possibly send a second text during the week to highlight something happening at the synagogue. **THIS IS AN OPT-IN PROGRAM;** meaning, you **WILL NOT** receive these text messages unless you explicitly ask us to include you in this program. To reiterate, if you do nothing, you will not receive these messages. In August, we will explain for those who would like to receive these messages how to OPT-IN.

Emergency Text Messages: We will use this technology in an emergency situation. We are also developing the ability to send a text message blast to every cell phone in our database in the case of an emergency. There are a variety of possible emergency scenarios in which it would be very helpful to have the ability to instantly notify the entire Ohr Shalom community. It is our hope that we would never send a message through this system, but we believe that it should be in place in case, God forbid, it is needed. **THIS IS AN OPT-OUT PROGRAM;** meaning, if you do nothing and we have your cell phone in our database system, that phone number will be added to the emergency notification system. If you would like not to be included, please notify us and we will remove your cell phone number from the emergency notification system. Again, it is our hope to never have to send a message to this distribution list.



God spoke and everybody at the foot of the mountain heard the voice. We are now implementing our own system, quite different but still truly remarkable. We believe that technology can be harnessed to strengthen our community and to make it safer.

Now put down your cell phone, go talk to friends and family, and go play outside – it’s summer!




MOVIE NIGHT


July 18 – William Wyler:



For those of us who have been at Ohr Shalom long enough, you will recall that our synagogue used to serve as a food distribution site for Jewish Family Service. But, when we began our building renovation project, our neighbors at St. Paul took it upon themselves to serve as the new distribution site. They now find themselves in the midst of a renovation project, and we are in a unique position to step in and once again provide a site for this work.

So, how can you help?

On the third Thursday of each month, Jewish Family Service runs their food distribution line at Ohr Shalom for over 200 individuals experiencing food insecurity. They need 2 parking spaces on Third Avenue in front of our synagogue that can be freed up for them to pull their food van in to do their good work. So, we are looking for two individuals who are willing to park their cars overnight on the third Wednesday of each month and leave them there until 1:00pm on Thursday. “Break Free From Barcoded Consumerism”

Facts: • People today consume twice as much as people 50 years ago (<https://storyofstuff.org/>).

- Just after WWII in the 1950s, it was planned for the US to become defined by consumerism. At the time, economist Victor Lebow stated “Our enormously productive economy... demands that we make consumption our way of life, that we convert the buying and use of goods into rituals, that we seek our spiritual satisfaction, our ego satisfaction, in consumption... we need things consumed, burned up, replaced and discarded at an ever-accelerating rate” (<https://storyofstuff.org/>).
- “Between 60-80 percent of the impacts on the planet come from household consumption” (Diana Ivanova, Norwegian University of Science and Technology).
- Worldwatch reports that worldwide annual expenditures for cosmetics total U.S. \$18 billion; the estimate for annual expenditures required to eliminate hunger and malnutrition is \$19 billion (National Geographic).


Challenge: Shop less. If you don’t NEED it, don’t buy it. Products are intentionally made to break or seem outdated. It’s called planned and perceived obsolescence, and it drives consumerism at an accelerated rate. Just because your phone is due for an upgrade or the latest iPhone is out, you don’t need to get it if your current phone still works. Same for fashion – you don’t need the new trend if your clothes still fit and don’t have (unintentional) holes.

The US spends 3-4 times more time shopping than Europe. We have less leisure time because we’re always working to pay for things, but we spend most of our leisure time shopping or watching TV (which encourages us to shop). Spend more of your leisure time doing activities other than shopping and watching TV, like hiking or having a picnic at a park.

Mindless consumption turns into excessive consumption, and more does not equal better. If you

have an urge to buy something, try this intentional approach (<https://www.becomingminimalist.com/less-consumerism/>):

1. Stop and reevaluate.
2. Stop copying other people.
3. Understand your weaknesses.
4. Look deep into your motivations.
5. Seek contribution with your life and usefulness in your purchases.
6. Count the hidden cost of each purchase.
7. Test your limits.
8. Give more things away.
9. Do more of what makes you happy.

If you do need to purchase something, try to do so in a way that harms the environment as little as possible. Try second-hand stores so there is no new manufacturing of the product. Look for materials that are sustainably sourced (cotton, bamboo, hemp) and won’t damage the environment further when washed (such as plastic synthetic fabrics). Some companies even contribute to the environment with each purchase (<https://www.tentree.com/>). We can’t change that we are born consumers; we need to eat (consume) to survive. We can, however, change the way and how much we consume. Changing our priorities to move away from a nation of consumers can have a significant positive impact on our environment by reducing the use of natural resource exploitation and pollution from the manufacturing and distribution of products.

KITAH VAV/ZAYIN MITZVAH PROJECTS

Working with preteens is a challenge. The students are skeptical about many things, including whether Judaism has the power to speak to them. In Kitah Vav and Zayin, our 6th and 7th grades, we have studied and written prayers for various holidays; we have worked on the meaning and structure of the prayer service and how to sing the prayers; we have talked a lot about *tikun olam* and doing *mitzvot*. As a culmination of these topics, the students are asked to formulate a personal project to help repair the world. Every time we do this, the students undertake dazzling projects. Here's a list of this year's wonderful projects:

Gideon Mandel: Collected 800 children's books for a low-income school in South Bay. He figured out the books' reading levels, designed and distributed book marks, and delivered the books to the children.



Hondo Garcia: In his project, "Cleats for Success," he has collected nearly 100 pairs of sports shoes with cleats, for children whose families can't afford to buy them.

Emory Pullen: She and her Dad helped an organization called "Burrito Boys" distribute burritos and other needed items to the poor. She especially enjoyed working with the children there.

Darianna Fox: Made toys and collected other objects for cats being sheltered at the San Diego Humane Society.



Stella Glick: Participated in clean-up drives through the Surf Rider Foundation, which seeks to clean up San Diego beaches and minimize the amount of plastic polluting our oceans.

Eliana Rose: Volunteered at "Friends of Cats," a cat shelter in El Cajon that shelters and provides medical care and love to homeless cats.

Nechama Bunton: Worked at an organization called "Feeding San Diego," making sure the food to be distributed is fresh and wholesome.



Madeline Schwab/Hannah Dean McLeod: Plan to participate this summer helping a group called "Welcome Home" in their efforts to provide for the needs of new immigrants to our community.

Emerson Hardy: Became involved with a group called "Challenged Athlete Foundation," making a fund raising page for them, and going to one of their events.



Zoe Carnot: Raised money for theatre productions for autistic children and learned to modify a play so that it would be suitable for this population.

Shianne Kodama: Raised over \$1700 for the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals by selling bracelets to family and friends.

Samantha Katz: Helped to organize a program on climate change for her school, inviting speakers and deciding how to raise student awareness.

SAN DIEGO JEWISH COMMUNITY UNITES AT ISRAEL FEST

Israel connected with our Jewish community at the spectacular Israel Fest 2019 held June 2nd at Liberty Station. The 3,000 who attended were treated to a well-organized event to immerse, to educate and to entertain all ages about our connections with Israel, with Jewish San Diego, and, as importantly, with each other.

The first scheduled component was a walk sponsored by The Friendship Circle, an organization dedicated to supporting children with special needs. This year's walk was dedicated to the memory of Lori Gilbert Kaye, one of the Friendship Walk's founders, murdered at the Chabad Synagogue of Poway last April. Walkers paid tribute to their friend and it was a befitting lead off to the day.

Ohr Shalom volunteers started early as well, focusing on the recent Space IL of Israel's mission to the moon. Our booth was decorated with authentic photographs highlighting the Beresheet spacecraft. Children had the opportunity to build their very own lunar module replica made from, yes, marshmallows and toothpicks, topped with an Israeli flag. The kids clearly enjoyed this along with many other fun activities with a focus on Israel. Thank you to all from Ohr Shalom who helped contribute to Israel Fest.

The Israel Fest site was filled with booths that provided adults and children opportunities to learn what is going on in our Jewish world. There were local, national and international groups represented, including Israel American Council (IAC), Jewish National Fund (JNF), Hadassah,

and Zionist Organization of America (ZOA). In addition, something new that I was especially excited to see was Honeymoon Israel, an offshoot of Birthright that is reaching out to young married couples having at least one Jewish partner to tour Israel.

It was a full day of Dor l' Dor, complete with wonderful musical entertainment all day including school children singing Hebrew songs, an Israeli band and an overflowing crowd of all ages doing Israeli dancing. There were the tastes and smells of falafel along with other kosher treats, a variety of vendors offering lovely original jewelry, Jewish gift ideas and Jewish-led tours to faraway places. People in all the venues dressed in blue and white. And the flags of Israel were flying everywhere. A real celebration of Israel.

I have been in San Diego for more than 45 years and have seen our Jewish community grow to 100,000 individuals living from Chula Vista to Ramona to Oceanside. Israel Fest is the only event held in San Diego each year dedicated to the entire Jewish community. And I believe it is more important now than ever to gather on this annual day to celebrate Israel and our Jewish heritage together with old friends and new ones too. What a great Israel Fest it was!
