## I AM EXHAUSTED – AND I AM GETTING UP TO GO TO WORK

I am tired. Really tired.

And I have a lot to do. I am exhausted and I have to stay at home, to protect myself, my family, the community. I am exhausted and I have to be out in the street standing up, kneeling because black lives matter and we have accepted violent injustice and systemic racism for too long.

I am weary because I am staying at home, I never go out without a mask, I wash my hands innumerable times, and the infection rate, and hospitalizations numbers are again climbing – in much of the country, and here in California. I am weary because it has been more than 150 years since the Emancipation Proclamation and the Thirteenth Amendment, we have been marching for longer than I have been alive, we have been working to reform education and language, and people are dying at the hands of those who are charged with protecting them and the reality of slavery and the perpetuation of the consequences of slavery are plainly visible throughout our society, even in Southern California, even in Jewish life.

I am tired. Really tired.

People often quote, and even sing, Rabbi Tarfon's teaching in Pirke Avot (2:16):

לֹא עָלֶיךָ הַמְּלָאכָה לְגִמְרוֹ, וְלֹא אֶתָּה  
בֶּן חוֹרִין לְבִטּוֹל מִמְּנוּהָ

"It is not incumbent upon you to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it."

Lovely teaching. Unequivocally true. But the comfort this teaching brings is the comfort of privilege. If you are mostly okay, then keep working but don't beat yourself up that we have not yet crossed the river into the promised land of justice. This is no comfort for George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, their families and millions of others who don't have the privilege to be comforted.

We are not at that moment of comfort now, we need to still be in the preceding teaching of Rabbi Tarfon (Pirke Avot 2:15):

הַיּוֹם קָצֵר וְהַמְּלָאכָה מְרֻבָּה, וְהַפּוֹעֲלִים עֲצֵלִים,  
וְהַשֹּׁקֵר הַרְבֵּה, וּבִעַל הַבַּיִת דּוֹחֵק

"The day is short. The work is multiplying. The workers are resistant to doing the work. But the reward is great. And God, the Master of the house, is demanding that we act now."

I am tired. Really tired. But public health demands we act. We must wear masks to be safe, and at the same time, we must scream "We Shall Overcome." We must stand at a safe distance from each other, and while doing so, stand shoulder-to-shoulder, all of us.

I am tired, but we must not rest, no matter our exhaustion, until all are healthy, safe and free.

### Self-Awareness Is Not Good Enough Anymore

Just when we thought that circumstances couldn't get any worse, the COVID-19 crisis in this country has been exacerbated by race-linked killings and minority group unrest. Over the past weeks, I'm sure that many people have examined their consciences, as have I, looking for vestiges of racist and otherwise prejudicial attitudes. Clinging to one's own kind and fearing the "Other" is deeply ingrained in us. Seldom have I been so aware of human frailty.

The killing of George Floyd evoked in me, as a white person, the same sadness I felt when Trayvon Martin was shot by George Zimmerman in Florida in 2012 and when Michael Brown, Jr. was shot by a police officer in Ferguson, Missouri, in 2014. Learning of the deaths of those young men (and, unfortunately, others), I believed that a vigilant examination of my own social attitudes was a good, and adequate, response. But I no longer think that becoming a bit more self-aware is sufficient. Prejudice and racism are deeply ingrained in our country and culture, and misfortune is growing evermore widespread. Perhaps because 2020 has been such an atypical year, with the coronavirus pandemic upending even my most ordinary aspirations, I feel a need to DO something.

We cannot all achieve political power, or become activists, or shout to the media, so, for me, DOING means investing time and/or money. I am selecting new public service organizations to support, and I suggest that you do the same – either as a volunteer or as a donor. Such agencies, dedicated to alleviating the pain of poverty or rejection or oppression, are not hard to find.

Those with time to donate should explore, at least when they can venture outside the house, [San Diego VolunteerMatch](#), an organization that dispatches volunteers to worthy projects. The mission statement of the local office says that they "assist African Americans and other underserved people in San Diego County to achieve social and economic equality through advocacy, bridge building, program services and research."

[Jewish Family Service of San Diego](#) is a model of public felicity. That organization, which currently is experiencing a dire volunteer shortage, is a social services cornucopia, offering counseling, providing meals, and, through the "Safe Parking" program, protecting the homeless who live

in their cars.

Prejudice doesn't affect exclusively people of color. We find it directed toward the elderly, the homeless, members of the LGBTQ community, the mentally ill, and others. [TAY Academy/San Diego Youth Services](#) is well-known to Ohr Shalom members, as we have been affiliated with that organization for years. TAY Academy provides daytime shelter, some overnight lodging, food, and community support to homeless young people. Sometimes these are pregnant teens, often they are LGBTQ kids who no longer are welcome at home.

[Chesed Home/Hope Village](#), in Escondido, is a residence for adults with mental illness, loosely affiliated with Chabad. Serving 12 persons at a time, it offers shelter, a nurturing community, supportive counseling, nutrition, exercise and vocational training. One of the few such comprehensive residential care homes in the U.S., Chesed Home/Hope Village often is cited as a model of effective treatment.

Headquartered in Mission Hills, [Special Delivery San Diego](#) prepares and delivers meals to individuals in San Diego with special dietary needs, as well as food staples to more than 800 local families.

[Feeding San Diego](#) collects and distributes food to thousands of San Diegans who are food insecure. Working with farmers, manufacturers and local retailers (Ralphs, Food4Less, Target, individual restaurants), Feeding San Diego rescues excess and unwanted food from across the supply landscape and delivers it to the hungry.

These organizations can be located online via Google. Each extends a hand to individuals in unfortunate circumstances, regardless of their color, sex, national origin or sexual orientation. All are 501(c)3 non-profits that operate via donations. DOING in the way I am advocating won't make our nation's crises go away, but it will move us a few baby steps toward alleviating them.

An election is coming up in November that will fill the Presidency and much of the U.S. Senate, thus affecting future policies vis-à-vis minority groups. One could argue that this will be the most important election of our lives. DOING, in terms of contributing time and money, on behalf of ethical, intelligent and responsible candidates also is a way that we can promote justice and decency in the United States.



### YAD EZRA V'SHULAMIT FIGHTS COVID-19 TO DELIVER MEALS AT HOME FOR ISRAEL'S HUNGRY CHILDREN

Since COVID-19 started spreading globally Israel has seen its economy and its citizens struggling, and, in particular, the worsening of the situation of those already living in poverty. Just as the United States is struggling to feed the hungry during this pandemic, Israel also has faced food shortages for these at-risk families. This includes one-third of the children in Israel.

One of the most prominent of the groups helping is **Yad Ezra V'Shulamit**, a humanitarian organization in Israel focused on helping needy families in Israel overcome poverty, with a special focus on feeding these children. Founded in 1988, Yad Ezra V'Shulamit is a nation-wide food operation that has brought meals to children's centers for youngsters who are living in poverty, regardless of religious affiliation, ethnicity, age, and location of residence.

Currently, Yad Ezra V'Shulamit has taken on the coronavirus challenge to provide meals that are needed more than ever. With unemployment skyrocketing in Israel, there are thousands of people who are the "new poor" who require help getting basic food to their families. Yad Ezra V'Shulamit, unwilling to leave these children vulnerable at home, transformed their organization to deliver the meals to homes. Keeping children under the poverty line fed in Israel is a real problem during the pandemic. As an "Authorized Emergency Service provider," Yad Ezra V'Shulamit has been operating in 47 cities in Israel. Thousands of hot lunches are hand-delivered weekly by volunteers. And the organization does more. These families also receive a cash voucher weekly for a local store to help the whole family survive better during these tough times. With the unemployment rate reaching well above 30 percent, many who were once working are now left without jobs and unable to provide.

Yad Ezra V'Shulamit is fighting a different kind of war. By providing food and other services to tens of thousands of Israeli children and their families each year, they are fighting a battle for the future of their most precious resource – their children. <https://www.yadezra.net/>


