## THE DEW HAS NOT FALLEN AND MY SADNESS IS INCREASED

There is a beloved midrash in a wonderful short collection called "The Midrash on the Ten Commandments" (*Midrash Aseret Hadibrot*). The collection is about one-thousand years old and it is traditional to study it on the Erev Shavuot.

After the introduction, the first "dibur" (saying? Utterance?) comes forth from God's mouth and when the Jewish people hear the power and majesty of that utterance they are blown backwards a great distance – twelve miles.

And they all die. Poetically: "their souls depart." It is about God's voice being too powerful to be contained in the world of the living. It is about the soul's remembering the world beyond filled with God's presence, and its desire to return to that world.

Don't fret, in the midrash the Torah speaks and reminds God that God intended to give the Torah to the living but now there is an obvious problem.

God responds to the Torah and says: בגלליך אני אחיה אותם -- "for your sake I will make them alive." God then sprinkles them with the dew of resurrection and everybody comes back to life so God can continue revealing the Ten Commandments and giving the Torah.

In the past, this little vignette made me smile, chuckle, and think about all the different ways this could be read, understood and treasured.

This year, as we prepare for Shavuot, there is a pallor hanging over my joy for the approaching holiday. This year, as we have counted the Omer, we have counted each successive shooting. It is unimaginable that I am afraid to reference some of the attacks and murders for fear of leaving some out.

As we have counted towards seven weeks, we have mourned shootings in homes and on streets, in grocery stores and places of worship, and in schools. Five months into the secular year, and we are well over 200 mass shootings.

It is not the "dibur," the utterance from God, but rather, the sheer power of that reality, our reality, is staggering enough to knock us all over. This devastating awfulness makes the spirit depart out of us.

Yet Torah says: בגלליך אני אחיה אותם -- "for your sake I will make them alive." Not for the sake of the tragic victims of our tragic society, they are dead and God's resurrecting dew has yet to fall, but because of us these victims will be given life. We will remember them. We will honor them. We will scream

## REMEMBERING HENRIETTA SZOLD, PART 2

As Part 1 in the May *Davar* ended, Henrietta Szold, at age 50, was about to recreate her life. Recovering from the demise of a love relationship and three years of severe depression, she moved to a new apartment in Manhattan and adjusted her friendship circle. Now, with confidence, she embraced a mission: Healing the Jewish people.

At that time, in 1911, Henrietta was one of the few Jewish people in the United States for whom launching such a grand social project was feasible. Up to that time, she had been an intellectual colleague of her influential rabbi father, had spent 18 years as Secretary of the Jewish Publication Society, and had completed coursework as a non-rabbinic student at the Jewish Theological Seminary. For more than a dozen years, Henrietta had been a member of the Executive Committee of the Federation of American Zionists (FAZ). Thus, prominent Jews in every category of American life were among her friends and acquaintances.

On February 24, 1912, Henrietta and 37 other women met at Temple Emanu-El in New York to form "Hadassah," so named as Purim was approaching. Henrietta had three goals for the organization: (1) empower women members by delegating significant responsibility to volunteers, (2) promote Zionism among American Jews, and (3) raise funds to alleviate the deplorable health and sanitation conditions she had observed in 1909 when she toured Palestine's Yishuv (Jewish community). Hadassah's founding members were the New York Jewish wives of the FAZ men. According to her biographer Dvora Hacoheh (*To Repair A Broken World, The Life of Henrietta Szold*, 2021), Hadassah's clarity of purpose, articulated by Henrietta, led to its instant and ongoing nationwide success:

She believed that the goal of establishing a healthcare system in Palestine would touch the heart of every Jewish woman in America and, as a concrete objective, would elicit the commitment and effort necessary to make it a reality (page 145).

Henrietta was determined that Hadassah should control the funds it raised and manage its own Yishuv medical projects. Its first endeavor (1913) was a mother-infant clinic in Jerusalem, staffed by two New York-trained nurses. During World War I, Hadassah raised funds for the American Zionist Medical Unit, which provided relief for the displaced and starving Jews of Palestine, where the British were fighting the Turks. In 1921, the Hadassah Nurses Training School, Jerusalem, graduated its first class of 22 young Jewish women. By 1924, the Medical Unit had become the Hadassah Medical Organization (HMO), which managed several clinics providing ophthalmological, dental and sanitary services, and staffed a hospital founded in Tel Aviv by American philanthropists Nathan and Lina Straus. The first Hadassah hospital opened in Jerusalem on Mount Scopus in 1939.

In 1920, Henrietta arrived in Palestine to take charge of the HMO. From then until the end of her life in 1945, she traveled constantly between Palestine and the USA to evaluate, encourage and expand the work of her far-flung organizations. In the *Yishuv*, she conquered resistance to the HMO's use of American medical practices, standards and staff. In America, Hadassah – outstandingly well-run and successful – survived repeated attempts by the Zionist Organization of America (successor to the FAZ) to absorb it and access its funds.





## OUR PRESIDENT CONTINUED

In 1927, Henrietta was appointed to the three-member Executive Committee of the World Zionist Congress (WZC), giving her administrative responsibility for health and education projects within the *Yishuv*. She resolved a financial shortfall and paid overdue teachers' salaries through a donation from Baron Edmond de Rothschild. During the 2½ years Henrietta held the WZC position, she set up a Yishuv Department of Education with orderly management and financing. Recalling the Russian Night School she had established as a girl in Baltimore, she also laid the basis for Israel's ulpan system of Hebrew language education.

Never flagging in her concern for social welfare in the *Yishuv*, Henrietta had founded in the Yishuv, in 1920, the Federation of Hebrew Women to raise money and support social work. Offering "justice for the unfortunate," it funded soup kitchens, tended to orphans, operated programs for juvenile offenders, and cared for the refugees of periodic Arab riots. In 1930, Henrietta was appointed to the Jewish National Council (JNC), the *Yishuv's* semi-autonomous governing body, receiving the Social Welfare portfolio. During the worldwide depression, from 1931 to 1939, she established social services offices throughout Palestine and founded a School of Social Work that eventually was incorporated into Hebrew University.

In 1933, Recha Frier, a rabbi's wife in Berlin, founded Youth Aliyah, an organization initially intended as a work-study program, but which evolved into a means to rescue European Jewish children from the Nazis. As head of social services for the *Yishuv*, Henrietta organized kibbutzim and youth villages as Youth Aliyah destinations – dealing constantly with pro-Arab British restrictions on immigration. Under Henrietta's determined leadership, Hadassah funded the program almost-totally, saving the lives of 30,000 Jewish children.

On February 13, 1945 at age 84, Henrietta died in Jerusalem, at Hadassah's modern medical center. The State of Israel commemorates Mother's Day annually on the 13th of February, honoring the brilliant and selfless American Jewish woman who nurtured it in its earliest years.

through the values of Torah that today's reality cannot be tomorrow's reality. We cannot complacently say "there will be a next time." We must shout and march, scream, demand and vote that today's victims are the last victims. The evil, violent, presence of mass shootings in our daily lives must end. It cannot be any longer. We will not accept it, and we will demand them same from those around us.

As we prepare to receive Torah, we must be active in ensuring that it is a Torah of life. That our actions, and the society that play in shaping will be a society that values and protects lives, that does not put powerful weapons of war in evil hands.

It has to be. We failed to accomplish that yesterday, and so we suffer today. We cannot fail today, lest we suffer more tomorrow.

### COMPASSION FATIGUE

A group of women are eating lunch in a busy cafe. Nervously, their waiter approaches the table. “Ladies,” he says. “Is *anything* okay?”



I care, you care, everybody cares. Who do you know who says “Oh the rainforest? Yeah, let it burn; I need more matchsticks.”

But sometimes, after going through the heartrending pleas you get in the mail, email and your phone, do you feel a bit overwhelmed? Standing at the sink rinsing out the peanut butter jar before putting it in the recycle bin, do you get the feeling that what difference is it going to make what I do when the need is so great? Its ok – its not on you and you alone to save the oceans, the forests, the whales, the children. But it isn't up to everyone else either. Take heart and do your part. That being said, maybe you didn't realize that California's investments in recycling collection infrastructure have brought substantial returns in the form of reciprocal investments and job creation by recycling manufacturers. The National Recycling Coalition reports that the recycling industry in California is both diverse and significant. The state hosts 4,342 recycling and reuse establishments that employ over 84,000 people, generate an annual payroll of \$2.25 billion, and gross \$14.2 billion in annual revenues. In California, for every job in recycling collection there are eight jobs created through manufacturing the recovered material into a new product.

Everyone knows recycling means less trash going to our landfills but the greatest environmental benefit of recycling is the conservation of energy and natural resources and the prevention of pollution that is generated when a raw material is used to make a new product. By reusing aluminum, paper, glass, plastics, and other materials, we can save production and energy costs, and reduce the negative impacts that the extraction and processing of virgin materials has on the environment.

It all comes back to you. Recycling comes down to one person taking action. New products can be made from your recyclable waste material We got this.

*(14) He [Rabbi Hillel] used to say: If I am not for me, who will be for me? And when I am for myself alone, what am I? And if not now, then when?*

I often think about this quote. Sometimes in reference to the path I've chosen and other times through a more global lens. There are many interpretations of Rabbi Hillel's famous quote, some focus on helping for truly altruistic reasons without recognition, some on the community coming together to achieve all 613 mitzvot (since one cannot achieve this alone) and still others on the importance of self-care before being able to help others. I think it's all of these. No situation has made this more clear to me than going through this Pandemic with all of you. At every turn, this community has come together to think about others and help others take better care of themselves.

I am constantly amazed at the phone calls and emails inquiring where to give, how much to give and to whom are we giving. The food donation bins are never empty for more than a day. As soon as JFS picks up the food, another donation arrives. When we collected clothing and toys for refugees, the foyer was filled; and our Toys for Tots box took two people and a dolly to get out the door. When an individual congregant is in need, people step up to make meals, phone calls and send texts. When our whole community needed healing our wellness classes offered solace, and the instructors generously donated their time.

And then there is the constant battle against Antisemitism and other hate. Daily the news tells us of another hate crime or antisemitic incident, and each time we are saddened, and we say NEVER AGAIN. I think about Rabbi Hillel's quote the most when I envision the thoughts of those going through these terrible situations. You must think about how to save yourself, while also thinking about how to help your friend standing next to you. We must act NOW.

Now we must help ourselves and help others and be prepared. Stay tuned for future announcements about Ohr Shalom preparedness sessions in the fall.

In the meantime, keep taking care of yourself and others.



## MACCABIAH GAMES COMING SOON TO ISRAEL AND SAN DIEGO WELCOMES IMMIGRANTS – AGAIN

On July 21st athletes from across the globe will gather at the Teddy Stadium in Jerusalem to bring in the 21st Maccabiah Games! The Maccabiah Games are an international Jewish and Israeli multi-sport event in Israel. It is the third-largest international sporting event in the world (after the Olympics and the FIFA World Cup), hosting this year 10,000 athletes, including some 2,500 Israelis, competing on behalf of 80 countries in 47 sports, organized in four divisions, including Open, Juniors, Masters, and Paralympians.

The Maccabiah Games were first held in 1932 at a time Jews were vulnerable, giving them an opportunity to project strength and pride to the world. At the first Games, at a stadium built with donations and filled to capacity, there were 390 Jewish athletes who took part from eighteen countries including sixty from Syria and Egypt. Since 1953 the Games have been held every four years, during the year following the Olympic Games. Since 1961 the Maccabiah Games have been supervised by the International Olympic Committee.

The Maccabiah Games are open to Jewish athletes from around the world, as well as to all Israeli athletes regardless of ethnicity or religion, including Arab Israelis. However, eligibility rules for Maccabiah competitors vary from country to country. Some delegations require athletes to be Jewish according to a strict version of religious law, while others have more liberal rules.

The Maccabiah Games recognize all 28 current Olympic sports, plus many others such as chess, cricket, and netball. In contrast to the Olympic Games and other major

international sporting events, the Maccabiah rules regarding accepting new sports are very lenient. New sports are accepted to the Maccabiah Games and competitions



can only take place if at least four separate delegations bring competitors for that sport (three in the case of female sports, as well as the Junior divisions). This year surfing has been added. This year, the Paralympics are adding Half Marathons and Wheelchair Basketball.

The Maccabiah Games, named for Judah Maccabee, launches the torch run used for the opening ceremony in Mod'in, Judah's birthplace. The Parade of Nations begins with participating athletes marching into the stadium, country by country according to the Hebrew alphabet. Furthermore, in contrast to some other international games, junior and disabled athletes in the competitions participate in the opening ceremony as well.



The official slogan of the Games is “80 countries, one heart” and is meant to represent the unity of the worldwide Maccabiah community. The Maccabiah Games mission is to facilitate a worldwide gathering of young Jewish athletes in Israel engaged in high levels of sports competition and strengthen their connection to the State of Israel and the Jewish people.

This summer, along with the Israel games, the Lawrence Family JCC will host the JCC Maccabi Games of North America for thousands of teens aged 12 to 16 from July 31-August 5th. Please support this exciting and historic event as a host and/or a volunteer. [jccmaccabisd.org](http://jccmaccabisd.org)
