LOOK INSIDE THE BOTTLE

רבי אומר, אל תסתכל בקנקו, אלא
במה שיש בו

"Rabbi Yehudah HaNasi says: Don't look at the bottle itself, but rather at that which is inside of it" (PIRKEI AVOT 4:20).

I'm sitting outside by the pool, sipping a soda, spraying on my sunscreen, daydreaming of ships on the ocean, smelling the challah baking inside the kitchen, and marveling at the variety of stuff that manages to get stuffed into a bottle.

I owe the Torah in my head this afternoon to Rabbi Yehudah HaNasi and to the USY Social Action project from last Friday afternoon: the former because nearly two thousand years after he first said it, Rabbi Yehudah HaNasi is still reminding us that it is the contents not the container that matters; and the latter because of the USY Challah-In-A-Jar project to raise money for *Tzedakah*.

Long before books had covers (actually long before books even existed as we think of them, as a "codex" to sport a cover) Rabbi Yehudah HaNasi taught us to look to the core, the content, the essence, rather than being deceived by the outward appearance.

Imagine, nearly two thousand years ago, he was concerned about the deceptive veneer, the glossy cover that misrepresented the actual quality of the contents. Hard to imagine what he would have to say if he time traveled into our world today.

And our amazing USY teens, who, let's be honest, pulled a fast one on us. If I may append a caveat to Yehudah HaNasi's teaching: *Ocaveat emptor*, let the buyer beware. There was no challah in the Challah-In-A-Jar. Turns out, when I

actually looked at what was inside, I found most of the ingredients for the challah (wise move to not include the eggs) and the expectation that I am smart enough to realize that to get the challah out of the jar requires eggs, a bowl, a cookie sheet, an oven ...

But lo and behold, as I looked in the Challah-In-A-Jar container (not actually a jar, but that is a commentary for another day) I found so much more than flour. I found a group of teens who decided that helping others was an important pursuit for their opening days of summer. I heard the laughter and belonging of a group of young Jews beginning to learn, independently, the value of creating community, being together, enjoying each other, growing together. Within that non-jar I could sense thousands of years of Jews concerned about others and expressing it through *tzedakah* – in the present tense.

Looking into that Challah-In-A-Jar I could see Torah, I could see history, and I could see the promise that today's teens will bring about a tomorrow even more filled with goodness, community, Torah, caring, and hopefully freshly baked challah.

So while I enjoy sipping from this can, feeling protected spraying on my sunscreen, and smelling the challah baking in the kitchen, big kudos to the amazing USY teens of Ohr Shalom and their adviser, Emily Curtis, for teaching us all to look deeper, care deeper, act up for good, and never miss a chance to do good – especially if it smells like fresh baked challah.

Enjoy your summer.

From 2014-2017, I had the honor and pleasure of serving as the Chair of the Social Action committee. I joined the board fairly soon after joining Ohr Shalom, and I have many fond memories of working with the board and working on social action projects and events. To get reacquainted with you all, I am providing a biographical summary.

I was born on a dark and chilly November night in East Cleveland, Ohio, to two Jewish-American parents who themselves were born and grew up on the east side of Cleveland. During the mid-1970s my mother scouted out a sunny new promised land in the Golden State, and she convinced my father to sell his pharmacy and move with my two siblings and the two dogs to La Jolla.

After surviving a Southern California youth and graduating San Diego State University, I married the lovely Christine Agostino (now Eisenberg), and we raised two children in San Diego. While my youngest child was entering high school, we were lucky to find Ohr Shalom Synagogue, which had been established at the site of our previous synagogue, Beth Israel.

I have worked most of my career as a geologist conducting environmental restoration and revitalization projects. I have enjoyed at different times in my life horseback riding, surfing, playing tennis, backpacking, traveling, and hanging out with friends in front yards, back yards and music venues. Christine and I feel blessed to live in this community, and we hope that Ohr Shalom's social action work will strengthen in its resiliency and vitality. This work aims to improve the environment and access to basic human necessities such as food, safe shelter, and clothing.

Food donations continue to be the centerpiece of our ongoing social action efforts, as evident by the barrels of food in the synagogue lobby. Please consider bringing a food donation during your next visit to Ohr Shalom. The food collected is donated to Jewish Family Service for their food distributions and home-delivered meals programs. We also plan to re-start providing warm meals to TAY Academy in Golden Hill when they start that program up again. The TAY Academy is a safe, inclusive, youth-led environment, which offers resources and gives support to transition-aged youth (ages 14-25).

Monet to Matisse

IMPRESSIONIST MASTERPIECES FROM THE BEMBERG FOUNDATION

San Diego Museum of Art Friday, August 5, 2:00pm

Ohr Shalom President and museum docent **Marvin Yudkovitz** will lead an additional tour of the exhibition before it leaves San Diego. The extraordinary works in this exhibition were collected by Georges Bemberg (1915–2011), the Argentine-French writer and musician who amassed one of the finest art collections in Europe. Today, the collection is housed at the Hôtel d'Assézat in Toulouse, France. This exhibition marks the first time the Bemberg Foundation's Impressionism collection, which rarely leaves its permanent home in France, has traveled to California. *Monet to Matisse* is one of only two showcases in the United States.

This docent tour is free, but there is an admission charge for the museum and an additional \$5 charge for non-members to the special exhibition. (If needed, Marvin can help out with a guest pass to the museum.)

IS THERE REALLY A START DATE FOR RESIDENTIAL ORGANIC WASTE RECYCLING?

The new service will be rolled out with residents receiving ample notification prior to the start date. This date is dependent on when the new Collections trucks arrive. Due to supply chain issues, new trucks to initiate this service will begin arriving the summer of 2022.

So what shall we do while we wait? Lets talk about the water we are supposed to be saving as the state goes through yet another driest of all summers.

How about shorter “Navy style” showers (water off to lather, on to rinse, 5 minutes with a timer) that we’ve heard about (this so doesn’t work with my crowd of young women all home for the summer) and even the excellent, although very labor intensive saving of water with a bucket or a watering can until the hot water kicks in? That’s OK for those with yards or patios or plant heavy balconies but pretty useless advice for everyone else.

So, here are a couple of easy suggestions:

Washing the car(s): Believe it or not, washing your car at home uses far more water than taking it to a self-serve carwash facility. The high pressure hoses at the car wash facility are able to effectively clean a vehicle with less water. (Not to mention the fact that washing your car at home dumps polluted water into the storm drains, which were intended for rainwater.) The typical garden hose uses up to 10 gallons of water per minute, meaning that a 10-minute home carwash could use 100 gallons of water. By comparison, a self-serve carwash typically uses about 11 gallons. Alternatively you can just let the dust and grime accumulate, watch your paint peel and deal with the well-meaning, helpful souls who write “Wash Me!” on your windshield.

Using the dishwasher: I know this seems counterintuitive, but automatic dishwashers typically use less water than washing dishes by hand. According to ENERGY STAR (https://www.energystar.gov/products/appliances/dishwashers/dishwasher_hand_washing), a dishwasher can save 5,000 gallons of water and 230 hours of time every year!

For the folks with yards: Recycling your washing machine water for use in the garden and yard. This one is complicated albeit VERY environmentally friendly. It can also be an expensive project. It’s doable even for the timid (we are trying this again, having learned many lessons, and will advise regarding the success of same), but in fact it requires a fearless relationship with PVC pipe, hoses, holding tanks, and an optimistic attitude towards possible flooding (https://www.sandiegocounty.gov/content/dam/sdc/deh/lwqd/LU_Clothes_Washer_System_Handout%205-11-2021.pdf).

THE CHAGALL WINDOWS CELEBRATE SIXTY YEARS IN JERUSALEM

The Chagall stained glass windows captured public imagination across the world when in 1961 they debuted first at the Louvre in Paris and then at the Museum of Modern Art in Manhattan. Called “extraordinary” by President John F. Kennedy, they reached their permanent home on the campus of Hadassah’s new medical center in Jerusalem in 1962. Present at the dedication ceremony, Chagall commented, “This is my modest gift to the Jewish people, who have always dreamt of biblical love, friendship and peace among all peoples.”

According to history, the windows came about when Hadassah representatives met with Chagall in Paris in the late 1950s with a compelling request for one or two stained glass windows for the synagogue in the Hadassah Medical Center planned on Mount Scopus. Instead, Chagall created and gifted twelve windows representing the 12 Tribes of Israel for the sanctuary.

The bible was his primary source of inspiration. Using Jacob’s blessings of his twelve sons, he designed twelve super-sized windows highlighting a theme for each son and a quotation from the individual blessings. The 11-by-8-foot works of art are filled with a dance of intricate images and stunning colors, with floating fish and cattle, flowers and trees, all reflecting Chagall’s signature abstract, folkloric, and whimsical style.

Marc Chagall’s complex designs can be best understood by first examining his world, both real and perceived, that includes his link with Jewish history and culture and his early life in a Russian shtetl. In his own words, “All the time I was working, I felt my mother and father looking over my shoulder; and behind them were Jews, millions of other vanished Jews, of yesterday and a thousand years ago.”

Chagall, working in France, started with color sketches and pen and ink before teaming up with a pair of stained-glass artists to produce the actual glass panels. Finally, Chagall could paint and etch using 50 intensified colors to create his designs and patterns for

firing. He ultimately sent trial panels to Jerusalem for light correction. Chagall’s dedicated handiwork accounts for the windows’ dramatic vitality. He described how glass was a transparent wall between his heart and the heart of the world.

Chagall was engaged throughout the production, installation and beyond. The story goes that when the windows were damaged during the Six Day War, the hospital informed Chagall of the loss via telegram. He told them, “You worry about the hospital, and I’ll worry about the windows.”

According to Barbara Goldstein, Hadassah Deputy Executive Director, the hospital has one of the greatest art treasures in the world. She reported there are women who come before they give birth and after they give birth to sit and pray. One synagogue wall lists the names of donors who contributed \$1 million per window. Proof that these Chagall windows are really priceless!

TRAVEL – GETTING BACK OUT INTO THE WORLD!

Guess what, friends? As it turns out, the world is still. Out. There.

Without dismissing all the reasons to come to San Diego as a destination, it is simply the most perfect place to come back to after an exhausting work trip... which has traditionally comprised at least half of Yale's and my working lives. For over two years, we really missed moving through the world, making new friends and seeing old ones, working for the pleasure and the income, and we couldn't wait to get back out there.

Our first "back out there" was this past April, when we led an Ayelet tour of Sephardic history and culture in Spain. It was pure joy after being stuck here in Paradise for two and a half years. We had a wonderful, rich experience with a great group of people. The good news? Most of the developed world has a higher vaccination rate and respect for pandemic protocols than here, ironically making it safer to travel than not to. The bad news? Covid is the new normal. First things first: DO plan your trip and DO go. In the most practical terms, there is a lot of access to rapid testing. But not every country has the antivirals, so if you think you might need them, bring them with you. This morning's good news (as I am writing this in June) is that the CDC has lifted its negative test requirement for U.S. citizens returning to the States (before today, you needed to wait as much as ten days after testing positive). I'm delighted it's no longer necessary, because we leave tomorrow for a recording and tour in Europe.



This coming October 23, we'll lead another musical and cultural tour for Ayelet, this time in Morocco (see more information about the trip on this page). As with Spain, we will give concerts with local musicians and create bonds with the tourgoers and the local Jewish communities. I can't wait.

So check your bucket lists. There is no reason to put off the world any longer. See you out in it.


